

We have lost another of the aborigines, well known in this district, Gallibrand by name. Gallibrand belonged, we believe, to the Colac tribe of aborigines, but was just as well known among the Camperdown ones. Until within the last two weeks, he had been in tolerably good health, but he then took sick, probably owing to exposure to the very severe weather. He was stopping in a mia mia with the Camperdown natives, in Mr. R. D. Scott's paddock, and Dr. Pettigrew was called in by Mr. Dawson, protector of aborigines, but could do nothing for him. He had arrived at a good old age, and gradually sank, after being visited, from a general failure, it is believed, of the vital powers. He died some time during Sunday morning, and was buried by Mr. John Walls in that portion of the Camperdown cemetery set apart for the aborigines. There are very few natives in this district now, and there will soon be none. It is some satisfaction, however, to know that they are well looked after.
